EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

On behalf of the Executive Committee I wish to submit for your consideration a report on the activities of the Australian Soccer Federation for the 1982 season. This report also deals with those events that have occurred since the publication of the last Annual Report in 1981.

As such the most significant event to occur in this period was the staging of the FIFA World Youth Championship in October 1981.

FIFA WORLD YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP FOR THE COCA-COLA CUP

The cold hard facts shown below indicating who played, who scored etc., do not reflect the impact that this event had on Australian soccer. The success of the Australian team, the comradeship built-up in States by very active committees dedicated to one common cause, indicated the capabilities of the code that can boast Australia's largest participating sport.

The citation shown on the opposite page was presented by the President of the Australian Soccer Federation, Sir Arthur George, to the many Committee Members from all over Australia who made this tournament such a success. Congratulations were still being received at the World Cup in June of this year from many of the visitors to our country during the FIFA World Youth Championship.

Four of the players have since the World Youth Championship been selected into the national team that won the Merlion Trophy. The skill demonstrated by the younger players representing Australia we hope will be an indication of the elevation of playing skills within our code.

At the date of publishing a trophy has not been named for this long overdue exchange between Australia and New Zealand, which it is hoped will become an annual event.

I am sure that every member of the national team and every soccer supporter in Australia will be looking forward to the return clash to avenge Australia's defeat in May 1981.

New Zealand aquitted themselves well in their further games for elimination and in the 1982 World Cup and will be much harder opponents now than they were in 1981. We would be remiss if we did not congratulate New Zealand on qualifying and displaying such a professional approach to their participation in the 1982 World Cup.

McDONALDS SOCCEROO SUPERSKILLS

Possibly the greatest contribution to the advancement of the skills of the game at grass roots was instituted on 31st March, 1982 when the McDonalds Soccer Superskills Award Scheme was announced.

Mr Peter Ritchie, Managing Director of McDonalds Systems Australia, announced to a gathering of soccer administrators and the press the details of their contribution towards junior soccer over the next three years.

Since that date over 6000 boys have attained awards at various levels in this scheme. Moves are planned to modify the scheme on an administrative level by having each State Federation dealing directly with their clubs instead of centralised administration through the Australian Soccer Federation.

McDonalds themselves are planning an awareness campaign to make sure that every one of the 449,000 players in Australia are aware of the scheme.

I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank McDonalds and in particular Mr Gerry Grace, the Marketing Manager, for the assistance given to the code by implementing this scheme for juniors.



THE MERLION TROPHY

Australia was invited to participate in the first Merlion Trophy conducted in Singapore in October this year.

The National Coach, Mr Les Scheinflug, selected a new Socceroo squad and trained the team for one week prior to departure. The success of this team which won the final and the Merlion Cup was outstanding. With a new fresh approach to the tournament the squad displayed the fighting spirit necessary to succeed.

This is the first step towards the preparation for the 1986 World Cup. The Executive extends to the coach and the members of the team their sincere congratulations on a very significant first step towards the 1986 World Cup.

Speakers from every State thanked Brian for his friendly advice over so many years and he was then presented with gifts from the Australian Soccer Federation and from the other States. The final speech of the evening was made by Mr Ted Gray, Secretary of Western Australia, and his ode to Brian tends to indicate the feeling of the various States and the friendly manner in which the presentation was held rather than a formalised farewell.

AUSTRALIAN SOCCER REFEREES FEDERATION

During our recent Annual Congress it was pleasing to hear various state delegates reporting that the co-operation and liaison between Soccer Federations and Referees was at a very high level. There are, however, problems that still exist in some areas.

The Membership of the ASRF stands at 633 registered senior referees. This figure is some 6% down on the 1981 membership.

The affiliated Federation still maintains a steady membership of some 2100 members.

The formation of the state referee coaches in each division is beginning to show results with consistency in coaching methods and interpretation of the laws at all levels of refereeing.

The setting up of a referees' sub-committee in all states is of a major importance to both bodies. The lack of standard procedures and duties of these committees is something the ASF Referees' Sub-committee will have to formulate in the near future.

FIFA REGISTERED REFEREES

In accordance with the regulations of FIFA Australia is entitled to nominate seven referees to the FIFA for inclusion on the international panel.

This panel were fully used during the FIFA World Youth Championship as linesmen. Mr Tony Boskovic was selected by the Referees' Sub-committee as Australia's nominee to act as a referee during the Championships. Mr Boskovic had a very active year during 1982 where he, for the second time, was selected by FIFA to referee at the World Cup.

We take this opportunity to sincerely congratulate him on this singular honour of participating in two World Championships. It must be appreciated that he was selected not because he is from Australia but on his individual ability.

We extend our congratulations to the other six FIFA referees in Australia on being nominated again and trust that they will

AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Australian Capital Territory Soccer Federation, the smallest in Australia, again proved that they have the best facilities and a first-class organisation to conduct the National Championships.

The Championships conducted in 1982 proved just as successful as the ACT Federation promotion of 1981. The Gowrie Hostel is an ideal situation for the accommodation and the grounds provided by the ACT Federation were first-class.

The National Coach, Mr Les Scheinflug, together with the assistance of State Directors of Coaching and State team coaches, selected a large squad from these Championships as the initial selection for the 1983 World Youth Championship team.

The results of the games are shown below, but again it would be remiss of the Australian Soccer Federation not to say thank you to the ACT Soccer Federation for the assistance given in conducting these Championships in a most efficient manner. To Mr Roger Grylls, the Championship organiser, and Mr Ron Harris, the President Mr Hal Leslie, I extend the sincere thanks of the soccer fraternity for your efforts in conducting these Championships once again for the Australian Soccer Federation.

NATIONAL U/16 CHAMPIONSHIPS

These Championships were conducted in Sydney this year and for the first time a municipal council assisted the State Federation with the arrangements and promotion of the Championships.

The civic minded approach of both Penrith City Council and Blacktown City Council was greatly appreciated by the NSW Soccer Federation and the Australian Soccer Federation.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Aulden Brown and Lionel Brown from the NSW Soccer Federation for their untiring efforts in promoting these Championships during the first week of September this year. The assistance of Mr Dennis Adrigan of the Penrith Council was also greatly appreciated.

Mr Jim Shoulder, the Australian Institute of Sport Coach, spent the entire week studying the abilities of the representatives from each State with possible selection for these players to be invited to attend the Australian Institute of Sport for 1983. The late withdrawal of Tasmania from the Championships tended to unbalance the two group system and it is an aspect that should be considered by the ASF Executive for future Championships.

With the high cost of accommodation it is just not practical to have a full round robin with all eight States participating. However, a system equitable to all must be derived.

The Oceania Football Confederation met in Sydney on the completion of the FIFA World Youth Championships for the Coca-Cola Cup.

The President of the Australian Soccer Federation, Sir Arthur George, was again elected President of Oceania with the Senior Vice President, Mr Vic Tuting, being elected to the committee of Oceania.

Mr Tuting also attended the Finance Committee meeting in New Zealand in October of this year. The Oceania Confederation is the smallest confederation in FIFA and as such inherits great problems regarding recognition within FIFA. With the 32 countries representing the European Confederation and another 30 representing Africa and 32 in Asia, the four countries of Oceania will always find it a struggle to attain the recognition deserved of a Confederation.

However, FIFA has recognised the obvious administrative talents of the President of the Oceania Confederation, Sir Arthur George, and he has been unanimously appointed once more as a co-opted member of the Executive of FIFA. This appointment has ensured the representation of the four countries of the Oceania region direct to the FIFA Executive.

We would like to sincerely thank our other full members of Oceania, that is New Zealand, Fiji and Papua New Guinea, for their support of this Confederation over the past twelve months Thanks are also due to Associate Members Tahiti, New Caledonia, Vanuatu and the Solomon Islands. At the time of going to press with this report, arrangements are being made

for the Oceania Youth Championships to be conducted in Port Moresby from 1st to 14th December, 1982,

The Australian Soccer Federation has offered its assistance to Papua New Guinea with regard to the arrangements for these championships. We feel they will be conducted quite successfully by the Papua New Guinea Soccer Federation.

HONOURS LIST

Two members of the soccer community were honoured during the 1982 season. The President of the NSW Soccer Federation, Mr Karl Rodny, was awarded the Order of Australia for his services to soccer.

The President of the South Australian Soccer Federation, Mr George Joseph, was also awarded the Order of Australia.

The Executive Committee would like to congratulate them on this high honour which is well deserved.

SID GRANT

During 1982 the official historian of the Australian Soccer Federation, Mr Sid Grant, passed away and with him passed considerable knowledge of the history of the game in Australia.

Sid Grant was a regular visitor to the ASF offices but never failed to arrive in the office without some small record of the code's history. Even when he was falling into ill-health he still displayed a sincere love of the game and he will be sadly missed by the code and the many many friends he made over such a long period.

Even though he has gone the records compiled by him will stay as an integral part of the history of the code within Australia.

MEDIA

For some unknown reason the Australian soccer community tend to regard the press as their public relations officers. This is not the case. People tend to deserve the government they get, I think it is also true to say soccer deserves the press it gets.

Whereas many of the major newspapers have soccer writers as such, many publications use journalists who may not be aware or familiar with the code as such. Many of the contributors to soccer newspapers are merely volunteers who give up their time to publicise the game according to their views and the information that they have researched.

If you feel the media is not giving the code a good press then maybe the code should be supplying more information on a more regular basis to those members of the soccer media who are attempting to report the activities of soccer in Australia.

I would like to thank all the journalists, both professional and amateur, who contribute articles for publication, for their efforts during 1982.

I would also like to thank Channel 0 for their coverage of our international games during 1982. Their coverage of local games, together with overseas games, is greately appreciated by the soccer community as a whole.

I would also like to thank the television and radio networks who in many cases have gone out of their way to seek information from various sections of the code during 1982.

I trust that the publicity officers of the various State Federations, National clubs and State League clubs will assist the journalists by supplying regular information to them. Once again we emphasise, if you require publicity for the code then it is your specific duty to supply this information to the media as a whole.

HAVELANGE YOUTH TOURNAMENT

In preparation for the elimination games for the 1983 World Youth Cup, the Australian national youth team is participating in the Havelange Youth Tournament in Mexico.

At the date of going to press with this report no games have been played in Mexico, however the team is there on a one week preparation prior to the tournament.

I trust that in the 1983 Annual Report we will be able to record the success of this tournament and the success of the youth team in the elimination games to be held in Port Moresby in December 1982, together with their following round if they are successful in New Guinea to be played in America in January 1983.

THE AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S SOCCER ASSOCIATION

The Australian Women's Soccer Association conducted their ninth National Championships this year in Brisbane. Of note is the fact that the Championships were conducted on fields belonging to the South Queensland Women's Soccer Association at Geebung.

After being on top for so many years, New South Wales were defeated and South Queensland took the title. For the first time, North Queensland Women's Soccer Association, located from Mackay northwards, took part in the games.

Internationally, an Australian women's team will be playing in Indonesia next March. There will be a series of three international games played on the 12 day tour.

Australia is now part of the Women's Oceania Football Confederation with Elaine Watson, the Australian President, being elected the Vice-president of the Confederation.

The first Oceania Women's Cup will be played in Suva, Fiji, next September.

Registrations this year totalled 7532 women players in the Australian Association. This showed an overall increase of 16%, with the biggest increase of 42% being in New South Wales.

ROTHMANS NATIONAL DIRECTOR OF COACHING REPORT

'After being a non-believer, I am now one of the strongest advocates of the Australian Soccer Federation coaching schemes.'

The above is the leading paragraph of an article written by John Perin in the Adelaide Sunday Mail of 9th May 1982.

Surely, the most objective measure of the success of the scheme to train coaches is to what extent top players attend instructional courses. There is full evidence of that happening in Australia.

John Perin was in good company when attending last year's Level III Senior Award course in Adelaide. He was one of four other international players also attending. So far, 13 of Australia's international players have attended coaching courses. There are also many state representative and state league players amongst those who see the sense in working at improving their coaching.

John says later in his article: 'You've got to go out and learn from qualified men, put what you learn into practice, then keep looking for new ideas.'
