

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The Balance Sheet of the Federation as at 31st August, 1984, discloses net assets of \$206,866, an increase of \$83,324 over the net assets as at 31st August, 1983. This increase results from the effect on the Federation's finances of the current Sponsorship arrangement and also increased Government assistance. I confidently expect that during the current financial year there will be a significant increase in the net assets of the Federation.

Apart from finance the calendar year 1985 is a very significant year for Australian Soccer. The Federation is involved in a number of world-wide International competitions.

In February next the Federation's Youth Team plays against youth teams from Chinese Taipei, New Zealand, Fiji, Israel and Papua New Guinea and the winner will qualify for the Finals of the 1985 World Youth Championship to be played in Chile in 1985.

In August the Federation's U16 Team will play in the first U16 World Championship organised by F.I.F.A. and the championship will be held in Peking.

In September and October, 1985, the Federation's Senior Team will play New Zealand, Chinese Taipei and Israel and thereafter on or about 15th November the winner will play the runner-up of the European Division 7 on a home and away basis to determine the Team which will qualify for the World Cup in Mexico in 1986. New Zealand, Israel and the European winner of Division 7 will be formidable opponents, as will Israel and New Zealand in the World Youth Cup Elimination matches.

I am sure that all members of the Federation and the Soccer public generally will wish Jim Shoulder and his team, Frank Arok and his team, and the U16 Coach, Vic Dalgleish and his team success and good fortune in their endeavours in these very important games.

The National Soccer League, the premier competition of the Federation, has found the current format of the League and the 24 Teams difficult to sustain, both on the grounds of cost, availability of sufficient suitable facilities and quality of football.

It is hoped before the end of this year to announce a new format.

One of the problems that faces the National League is the question of the Management Committee being Club orientated. This, of necessity, leads to compromise in circumstances where sometimes the unpleasant decision is the correct decision.


It is my view that consideration should be given to the appointment of a General Manager with wide ranging Executive authority and he should be responsible to a Committee which, whilst having Club representation, is not dominated by Club affiliated representatives. The newly appointed sub-committee of the A.S.F. National League is a step in the right direction.

I appreciate that this is a contentious issue but to survive I feel that the National League requires a new format, a smaller number of participating teams, resolute management and professional promotion.

I hope that the recommendations that will come before the Executive of this Federation later this year will be such as will include mature consideration of the matters I have raised.

I have pleasure in placing before you my report, the Report of the Executive, the Profit & Loss Account and the Balance Sheet of the Federation for the year ending 31st December, 1984, for receipt, discussion and adoption by you.



In May and June the Australian Soccer Federation Marketing Company sponsored the staging of an international series featuring World Class club teams. The fielding of a National 'A' and 'B' team proved that there is a depth of talent within the Socceroo Squad that surprised many supporters.





## AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF SPORT

The partnership developed between the Australian Institute of Sport and the Australian Soccer Federation in conducting the preparation for the National Youth Team is proceeding smoothly.

National Youth Coach, Mr Jim Shoulder, has brought many of the top Youth players to the Institute for individual training.

The Australian National Team also visited the Institute on 19th and 20th September for a 2 day training camp. The magnificent facilities were greatly appreciated by the coaching staff and the players.

The first level 4 coaching course was also conducted at the Institute and again the facilities assisted with the promotion of this event.

The National Team has also been invited to participate at the Institute during January and the Youth Team will be using the facilities during February of 1985. The President of F.I.F.A., Dr Havelange, will be visiting Australia during 1985 and one of the first items on his itinerary will be a visit to the Institute.

I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely congratulate the Minister of Sport, the Hon. John Brown, on the development of the Australian Institute of Sport. If all other sections are working as successfully as the soccer department, the elite athletes of all sports will benefit considerably.

During my negotiations for the China-Australian Ampol Cup arrangements, I had the opportunity to visit the Shanghai Spare Time Sports School. This is one of China's Institute of Sports. Our facilities compared most favourably with them, however, they do tend to become far more involved on a decentralised basis. The concept of the School in Shanghai is that certain schools within the area identified talent at various sports. At the age of 12 the children leave their school and attend the Spare Time Sports School until the age of 17. During those years, they carry out their normal academic duties together with a minimum of 4 hours per day specialising in their particular sport. I consider the next development of the Australian Institute of Sport will be similar to this where decentralised facilities will be set up in each State to assist with the talent identification of those athletes who should be attending the Institute of Canberra. To Jim Shoulder, Ron Smith and all the staff of the Institute of Sport, I extend sincere congratulations from the Australian Soccer Federation.

#### WEST-NALLY

West-Nally, as the major shareholder of the Australian Soccer Federation Marketing Company, have assisted in the financial stability of the Australian Soccer Federation. 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## THE AUSTRALIAN SOCCER REFEREE'S FEDERATION

An era comes to an end at the end of 1984 when Mr Wal Bates retires as Secretary of the Australian Soccer Referee's Federation. It has been an absolute pleasure to work with Wal over the past 5 years. I am sure that Brian Le Fevre, the former Secretary, will also wish to extend his thanks to Wal for his assistance over the 11 years that he worked with him.

A system was introduced at the beginning of 1984 to identify those referees with the potential to replace F.I.F.A. referees as they retired. The Referee's Committee appointed some of these referees to the international fixtures, both as referees and linesmen during June of this year. Some of these referees showed that with further experience they will be worthy

successors to the current F.I.F.A. referees. This system must be expanded so that there is a natural stepping stone process introduced for referees to move to the international level.

The Talent Identification for referees and the seminar conducted in Canberra in May of this year proved an absolute success. The gathering of the State Referee's Instructors for one week in conjunction with the Under 19 Talent Identification Scheme, together with the nominated referee from each State created the perfect environment for the seminar discussions that were held. This will be slightly modified and conducted again during 1985.

I take this opportunity to sincerely thank the thousands of referees who, each weekend, participate at all levels in our game. To say that it is a thankless job is a gross understatement. However, I am sure that the majority of referees keep in mind that if they made as many mistakes as the average player, then they would seriously consider giving the game away. The problem is we lose so many referees through abuse from people who do not know the rules and to say that this is part of the game is not good enough. Dr Havelange defines soccer as a game of passion, other prople consider it a war without weapons. In either of these situations emotions must run high. So I thank all the referees again for working under conditions that are based on emotion and not logic.

1984 saw a change of the administration of the Australian Women's Organisation. The long standing Chairwoman, Mrs Elaine Watson, and the Foundation Secretary, Mrs Betty Hoar, have given outstanding service over the past years.

#### OCEANIA CONFEDERATION

Two meetings of the Oceania Confederation have been held since the last Annual Meeting. One meeting was held in New Zealand and one was held in Zurich prior to the Consultative Meeting with Dr Havelange. A further has been held in Brisbane owing to the fact that the Oceania Secretary, Mr Keith Young, has now moved from Papua New Guinea to Brisbane. F.I.F.A. have assisted Oceania with funds for both coaching and refereeing and a programme is being designed to assist with the promotion of the under-developed countries in Oceania. Consideration is being given to the classification of membership of Oceania. Only those members of F.I.F.A. are classed as full members, while other countries are being granted associate membership. This is further complicated by the fact that some countries, for example, New Caledonia and Tahiti, are protectorates of France and as such require the approval of France prior to being members. The third category is those countries who are attempting to meet the criteria of full membership to F.I.F.A. I consider it an obligation for Oceania to assist these countries in reaching the criteria necessary for full membership. Oceania has the advantage of being a small Confederation and as such should be able to assist one another without the problems that arise in a large Confederation such as Africa, with 32 countries.

The Oceania Confederation should be far more aggressive in its attempts to assist those countries who are seeking full membership. A submission was placed before F.I.F.A. to enlarge the boundaries of Oceania so a more equal representation could be placed before F.I.F.A. relative to other Confederations. However, it is not possible to force countries to move from one Confederation to another and as F.I.F.A. determine the boundaries originally, it should be their prerogative to alter the boundaries to make a more equal distribution of its members. This does not preclude Oceania from attempting to strengthen the existing membership within the existing boundaries.

Suggestions for a Pacific Cup for the champion club team from each country were discussed at the last meeting. I consider that the Oceania Confederation needs assistance and Australia and New Zealand should assist as much as possible.

### DEPARTMENT OF SPORT, RECREATION & TOURISM

The Minister of Sport, Recreation & Tourism, the Hon. John Brown, has certainly brought about a new image for the Department. Not only has the allocation of funds doubled from 1983 to 1984, but we believe it is possible they will double again from 1984 to 1985. He has instigated the Sports Commission, which is a Statute Authority, will greatly assist our industry. The involvement of top businessmen together with athletes who have been through the process of training for World events, will be of a distinct advantage to Australian sport.

Sport at international level is not a hobby or a past-time, it is a big business and the Minister's recognition of this fact in forming the Sports Commission is to be applicated.

## AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION OBJECTIVES

The Australian Sports Commission has been established to increase the co-ordination, and therefore the effectiveness, of sports development policies and programmes in Australia in order to achieve the following objectives:

- To sustain and improve on Australia's level of achievement in international sporting competition.
- To increase the level of participation in sport by all Australians.

## AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION FUNCTIONS

- 1. To provide another source of policy advice to the Minister.
- 2. To define needs and recommend on priorities for action to ensure the most effective and equitable use of sports funds.
- 3. To make recommendations to the Minister on the allocation of funds from the Commonwealth Budget and to administer their disbursement in accordance with directions from the Minister.
- 4. To generate funds, through a Sports Aid Foundation, to supplement Government funds and to determine and administer their disbursement within guidelines approved by the Minister.
- 5. To foster co-ordination of sports research and initiate research projects as appropriate.
- 6. To consult with sporting bodies including through consultative committees as appropriate.
- 7. To develop and provide information for sporting organisations.
- 8. To evaluate relevant sports programs and policies to ensure they are achieving the outcome they were intended to produce.

## NATIONAL DIRECTOR OF COACHING

Thirty-five accredited coaches attended the first Level 4 course held at the Australian Institute of Sport in September. Amongst the members of the course were coaches of N.S.L. and Premier State League Clubs along with State Directors of Coaching.

In the final discussion on the course the members agreed that there was a need for the formation of an association of professional coaches. Mr Ken Kaiser and Mr Mick Jones were nominated to recruit two other coaches to form a four man Steering Committee. The committee would then arrange to meet Mr Brian Emery to discuss ways and means of forming such an association.

State Directors held their annual meeting immediately after the Level 4 course. Amongst the items was a proposal for compulsory accreditation for coaches working with N.S.L. and Premier State League clubs. This will be discussed at the next A.S.F. Executive Meeting.

A further item was the acceptance of new Instructors' Manuals for the Level 1 and Level 2 Coaches Courses.

The A.S.F. 1984 Handbook contained the new "Laws of the Game Modified for Mini-Soccer". These provide modified laws for players in the Under 9, 10 and 11 age groups and is in keeping with the F.I.F.A. modifications for young players.

The small attendances are a fact and as such this is reflected in the press. A similar situation occurs with the coverage of State League fixtures. Some journalists have a positive approach and others not so positive. However, one aspect that is evident is that the media is not receiving the service from the code that they should. Regular press releases and press conferences are not held and as a result this reflects in the confusion that is quite often caused within the press. I therefore respectfully request that all sections of the code assist the press by supplying them with current up to date information and proposals of their future plans.

I take this opportunity to sincerely thank the professional and part-time journalists who assist in the promotion of our code.

## FEDERATION OF INTERNATIONAL FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION

In May of this year the President, Sir Arthur George, and myself had the honour to attend the 1984 F.I.F.A. Congress. F.I.F.A. again displayed the typical Swiss efficiency to show why it is one of the most respected World sporting organisations. The programme laid down during the 5 day period has been distributed to Executive Members and the advantages of participation in this inter-change of information and ideas between the 151 members is a distinct value.

I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank the President, Dr Havelange, for his assistance during this period regarding the re-forming of the elimination series for the World Youth Cup. His attempts to rationalise the number of games that it is necessary to play to qualify for the World Cup was also appreciated. His personal assistance in obtaining a permanent place on the F.I.F.A. Executive was appreciated although it was not successful.

Australia will have the opportunity to welcome the President of F.I.F.A., Dr Havelange, during 1985 on his Oceania tour.

I would also like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank Mr Harry Cavan, the Senior Vice President of F.I.F.A. who is only too willing to assist at all times with any problems involving international affairs. To Mr Sepp Blatter the Secretary of F.I.F.A. I extend the sincere thanks of the Executive for your assistance during 1984.

#### F.I.F.A.'S REFEREE LISTING

Last year we reported that Mr Tony Boskovic had reached the retirement age and as such was replaced by Mr Tim Davies on the F.I.F.A. List. It is now with regret that we must advise that Mr. Tim Davies has been forced to retire through injury and is no longer on the F.I.F.A. List.

We offer our congratulations to Richard Lorenc for his inclusion in the F.I.F.A. Listings and we trust that there will be sufficient international fixtures arranged so that Mr Lorenc can obtain his F.I.F.A. Badge.

#### F.I.F.A. COMMITTEES

During the 1984 season, Sir Arthur George, as a co-opted Executive Member of F.I.F.A., attended meetings in Zurich.

As a member of the F.I.F.A. Administrative Committee I also had the privilege of being appointed as the Match Inspector for the Olympic Games fixture New Zealand versus Japan.

Mr Eric Worthington has been called on by the Oceania Committee to assist with the arrangements of the coaching for the Oceania Region. Eric will also be called upon to assist with the organisation of Project 10. This Project, designed by F.I.F.A., will be conducted in May in Australia. It will involve the National Coach, Assistant Coach and Youth Coach of those countries who are members of the Oceania Confederation.

#### THE AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC FEDERATION

The Australian Soccer Federation will be entering into the next Olympics. The clarification of Rule 26 of the I.O.C. has now made it possible for the Australian Soccer Federation to participate. The elimination series that is conducted on an Oceania/Asian Confederation basis will involve Australia in approximately 15 games to qualify for the next Olympics.

There can be no better transition for National Youth Team players to participate in the Olympics before moving into the World Cup Squad. On current trends, many of the World Cup Squad players will still be young enough after the 1986 World Cup to participate in the 1988 Olympics.

The assistance of our Marketing Company in raising funds for this venture has already been assured.

#### CONFEDERATION OF AUSTRALIAN SPORT

In the Annual Report last year it was indicated that the Confederation of Sport should step back and have a look at it's aims and objectives. At the last Annual General Meeting the National bodies making up the Confederation of Sport clearly gave the message that the Confederation was entering into fields that conflicted with it's members.

It is a shame to report that some sports have actually withdrawn from the Confederation of Sport. The sports cannot help the co-ordination of sport as a whole if they are not members.

It is becoming obvious that the Confederation of Sport will now have to lobby to the Australian Sports Commission for additional funds to support. I anticipate that there will be a free enterprise approach by the Commission to fund raising

for sport and as such the Confederation may be speaking on behalf of the minority of sports and not the large participating sports. This fragmentation will not assist any member of the Confederation and every endeavour should be made to have all those sports who have left returned to the Confederation. There should be no confliction of interests when it comes to the promotion of our industry.

#### OFFICIAL SUPPLIERS AND SPONSORS

A long term friend heads this year's list of official quiet achievers and that is Rothman's National Sports Foundation.

#### ROTHMANS NATIONAL SPORTS FOUNDATION

T.A.A. have been of great assistance to the Australian Soccer Federation and I would like to sincerely thank the company and the three gentlemen in particular for this assistance. This is the 14th year that T.A.A. have assisted the Australian Soccer Federation and I trust this association will continue for many years to come.

#### McDONALDS SOCCEROO SUPERSKILLS

1984 saw the disbursement of the McDonalds Socceroo Superskills to each of the State Federations. The direct contact between the local franchisee and owners of McDonalds and the State Directors of Coaching has led to a far better understanding of the system. Many schools are now calling for the Socceroo Skills programme as a method of measuring the advancement of individual skills.

McDonalds should be congratulated for continuing this system and we trust that the decentralisation has led to a far better contact with store owners and the participants.

#### NATIONAL JUNIOR COUNCIL

The National Junior had two non-voting members on the Executive during this year. They had, during 1983, participated in the Oceania Under 15 Championships to qualify for the World Under 16 Championships. These titles were to be held in 1984 but F.I.F.A. could not find a sponsor for such a large event and as such the titles are being held in 1985. China has been allocated the Championships from 1st to 14th August. Australia, as a winner of the Oceania Confederation now qualify for these titles. The Executive at the last Meeting, held during 1984 season, allocated the Under 16 World Championships organisation to the National Junior Council. This will be their first venture onto the World stage and I am sure that they will seek all assistance necessary from the National Coach and the National Youth Coach in preparing their squad.

The National Junior Council also conduct their National Junior Championships in the Under 13, 14 and 15 age groups. The results listed below indicate the order in which each State finished in these Championships.

#### TALENT IDENTIFICATION SCHEME

#### **UNDER 19**

The Under 19 Talent Identification Scheme was conducted in Canberra and organised by the National Youth Coach and the Australian Institute of Sport's Coach, Mr Jim Shoulder. These Talent Identification Schemes have a dual purpose. One is to determine the best representative team from each State and the other is to identify the talent for both the National Youth Team and the Institute of Sport. Extensive tests were conducted during the week and each player was viewed while under pressure in competitive situations with their peers from other States.

During this series the referees also conducted their own Talent Identification Scheme in the form of seminars and participation.

#### **UNDER 16**

The Under 16 age group is a complete duplicate of the Under 18/19 Talent Identification Scheme. It is necessary at this age to identify players for the Australian Institute of Sport. The Under 16 age group will also now receive further importance by the participation of Australia in the World Under 16 Championships. Whereas Australia will have to participate at Under 15 in the Oceania section to qualify, the year prior to the Under 16 Championships, it will be necessary for the Under 16's to be used as a further Talent Identification. It therefore may be necessary to move the Under 16's back from August to the May School Holidays to assist with this Talent Identification.

The Scheme conducted this year in Sydney by the N.S.W. Federation was played at the St. George Stadium and the Sydney Athletic Field. The importance placed on this age group by the State Federations is reflected by the allocation of their State Directors of Coaching to control their teams.
