

# PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The Accounts, Balance Sheet and Profit & Loss Account for the year ending 31st August 1985 have been distributed to members, and it will be noted that accumulated reserves have been reduced from \$210,744 to \$41,735.

A detailed perusal of the accounts will indicate the reason for the deterioration, but also will at the same time highlight the long term problem that faces the Federation.

The Under-16 Team preparation and other costs, when one includes the Under-16 Talent Identification, and the costs of the visit to China, cost the Federation a total of \$105,361.

The Under-19 Team, after given credit for \$50,000 of sponsorship, and including the cost of the Interstate Talent Identification, cost a total of \$158,642. These sums together total \$264,003.

In so far as the World Cup campaign of the Senior Team is concerned, the only cost is \$48,804, principally concerned with expenses related to the Merlion Tournament in Singapore.

Those that decry the benefit of the present sponsorship agreement (although I am the first to admit that it wants some measure of re-negotiation), should then note that a minimum of \$200,000 to \$250,000 would have been required to prepare the National Team, a financial hurdle which would have been insurmountable as far as the Federation is concerned.

We have now reached the situation where in every four year period there will be two Under-16 World Championships, two Under-19 World Youth Championships, one Olympic Games, and one World Cup. Hard decisions will have to be made by the Federation as to the priorities which have to be established, the source of funds, and the practicality or otherwise, of entering for all these competitions.

On the playing field the Under-16 Team performed admirably. With some luck it could have reached the Finals, and their performance has been praised by the F.I.F.A. representatives and others.

In so far as the Under-19 Team is concerned, it was eliminated in the first round, after being beaten 3-2 by Nigeria, although it was leading 2-Nil at half time, in a match which if won, would have taken the team to the quarter finals. I am not satisfied that full advantage was taken of all the player resources available to the Federation, in respect of this age group.

In so far as the World Cup is concerned, the Senior Team has had an unparalleled preparation. It performed creditably against some of the great club teams of the world, and as at the date of this report, having played two vital away matches, the team has scored three out of a possible four points. I think we are entitled to assume that they will win the two matches against Chinese Taipei, bearing in mind the results achieved by that team against Israel, and New Zealand, so that the team would have seven points at that stage in hand, with two home matches against Israel and New Zealand to play. I don't think it is unduly optimistic to regard the team as favourites to win the Oceania Group, if it continues to play as it played in Israel.

The Olympic Tournament in Korea will now be played under the old rules, that is, it will not be limited to Under-23, as this rule will not apply until the 1992 Olympics, and perhaps reconsideration will have to be given, as to whether the Federation participates, and if so, how?

A continuing problem in Soccer is the performance of the National League. There is universal acceptance by the League, and by the Executive, that the present format is not working, and there is however, a singular lack of consensus as to what may, or may not be a desirable format.


It would appear that changes for the 1986 year would be unfair to the participating clubs, to the two clubs due to be promoted, and the State Federations, and mature and serious consideration will have to be given to this problem.

During the year there were a number of outstanding events. Firstly, the visit of Dr. Havelange and Mr. Harry Cavan, which was very satisfactory, and cemented the relationships between Australia and F.I.F.A. Secondly, the holding of the successful F.I.F.A./Coca-Cola Coaching Academy involving the Oceania countries. Thirdly, the involvement of Kodak in our Under-16 Team. Fourthly, the announcement by the New South Wales Government relating to the construction of a new football stadium to serve the three football codes, League, Union and Soccer, and finally, the setting up of the Sports Commission, and the assistance to Soccer by that Commission. As this report goes to print Soccer has been given an increased grant by the Commission. Our thanks are due to the Commission, its Chairman, Mr. A. E. Harris, and its Executive Officer, Mr. Greg Hartung.

On behalf of the Executive of the Australian Soccer Federation I would like to thank the many companies who support some sections of our code. To Rothman's National Sports Foundation, T.A.A., Travelodge, Olympic Airways, Mitre, Adidas, Coca-Cola, Ampol and a new friend, Kodak, I say 'thank you', on behalf of the many participants and supporters of our game.

# WORLD YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIPS FOR THE COCA-COLA CUP U.S.S.R. — 1985

The Australian Youth Team, after qualifying in February by winning the Oceania-Israel Elimination Series, travelled to Russia in August of 1985 to participate in this series.

Australia were drawn with U.S.S.R., Canada and Nigeria. The Australian Team, although drawing with the host country, Russia, who finished fourth in the competition and drawing with Canada, were defeated by the Nigerian team, who eventually finished third, to be eliminated from this series.

This was the third time that Australia had qualified for the World Youth Championships, and it was expected by many that the team would reach the quarter-finals, if not the semi-finals.


# AUSTRALIAN UNDER-16 TEAM 'THE KODAK KIDS'

### NATIONAL COACHING SCHEME

Thirty-five N.S.L. and Premier State League coaches attended the Part B of the new Level 4 course held at the Australian Institute of Sport in November. The Part A was held in 1984.

The level 4 course is designed to increase a coach's awareness of the job-skills of the Manager-Coach.

While the Part A places emphasis on the practical elements of the job the Part B stresses the importance of sports science and management skills.

Topics drawn from Sports Psychology, Exercise Physiology and Sports Medicine were presented by lecturers drawn from the Sports Science Staff of the Australian Institute of Sport.

Other topics included Team Management and the Financial Management of a soccer club.

A technical report arising from the visit by the National Director of Coaching to the World Youth Cup Championships in the U.S.S.R. has been circulated. It presents actions that need to be taken by the youth coaches for Australian Youth players to continue to match the skill of the leading soccer nations.

A FIFA 'International Academy' was presented in Sydney in June. Attendance was limited to coaches of National Teams and the National Director of all Oceania member countries. With Australia acting as the host country it was appropriate that all State Directors also attended.

An instructional course for coaches and other non-playing personnel was presented in Chinese Taipei in August on behalf of the Oceania Confederation.

Alan Vest (N.S.W.) and Alan Vessey (Qld.) acted as Lecturer Instructors.

# VISIT BY F.I.F.A. PRESIDENT, DR JOAO HAVELANGE



# FIFA/COCA-COLA INTERNATIONAL COACHING ACADEMY

Australia was again selected as host to conduct an International Coaching Academy for National Coaches for countries from the Oceania Region.

The seminar officially opened by F.I.F.A. representative, Sir Arthur George, on Monday 27th May, was the start of a ten day intensive seminar conducted by Mr Heinz Marotzke of F.I.F.A., and Mr Billy Bingham, the coach of the Northern Island Team.

I am sure that all participants left this seminar with a greater understanding of the coaching situation within the Oceania Confederation. To Mr Heinz Marotzke and Mr Billy Bingham I extend the sincere thanks of all participants and the Australian Soccer Federation for the knowledge, time and understanding displayed during this extremely successful Academy.

I also take this opportunity on behalf of the Executive to sincerely thank Coca-Cola for their assistance and involvement in this seminar.

Coca-Cola have been friends of the Australian Soccer Federation for many years now, and their involvement with the National Youth Team and the F.I.F.A. conducted Coaching Courses, are synonymous with the game.

### **AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION**

The Australian Sports Commission grant of \$135,000 from the Sports Development Programme for 1985-86 is a practical demonstration of the assistance the code is receiving from the Government. \$75,000 of this grant is for talent identification for the Under-16 and -18/19 age groups.

The Under-16 costs for 84/85 were \$48,144 for selection and another \$61,217 for training and participation.

The Under-18/19 costs are even higher with \$46,410 being spent on selection procedures and a further \$116,035 on preparation and participation.

This total of \$271,806 spent on the A.S.F. youth programme would not be possible without the \$75,000 from the Australian Sports Commission and the \$50,000 from A.S.F. Marketing.

On behalf of the Executive may we congratulate the Commission on the practical approach they are taking to assist with not only the participation of future champions, but also, with their development.

## 'UNCLE JOE' VLASITS

The Australian soccer fraternity was greatly saddened during this season at the death of former National Coach 'Uncle Joe' Vlasits. He was appointed National Coach in 1967 and laid the foundation of the squad that reached the World Cup finals in 1974. His intense interest in the development of younger players was exemplified by the Canterbury team and his involvement in the first two National Youth teams. He will be sadly missed.

## PHIL O'CONNOR

The sudden death of Socceroo Phil O'Connor shocked the soccer family late in the season. Phil had represented Australian on 29 occasions. He was a member of the touring team to China and Europe at the end of the 1984 season. Over 300 fellow players attended Phil's funeral service at Dapto and this was an indication of the respect and friendship that Phil shared with so many people within the code.

The Executive extend their condolences to the families of both Uncle Joe Vlasits and Phillip O'Connor.

# AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S SOCCER ASSOCIATION (Inc.)

Highly creditable results recorded in major overseas tournaments and New South Wales' success in lifting the 1985 National Championships from 1984 winner south Queensland highlighted the past year's activities.

The 1984/85 year saw Mr Allan Hampton of Northern N.S.W. leading the organisation, and for 1985/86 he has been succeeded by former president Mrs Elaine Watson of South Queensland.

Following the 1984 National Championships in Canberra, tours took place by the National team to both the Peoples Republic of China and to Chinese Taipei.

Australia ran second to the USA in the prestigious Xian International Women's Football Tournament, which included highly rated Italy and Japan.

The World Women's Football Tournament in Taiwan was a magnificent success. Against 11 national teams Australia ran fifth, with West Germany worthy winners.

Congratulations to Jim Selby for his efforts as National coach. Fred Robins has now taken over the reins.

Our touring parties shoulder big personal financial burdens. Strong efforts are being made to gain support from the corporate sector for the Oceania Cup, to be held in Christchurch from March 29/April 12 1986.

New South Wales withstood strong pressure from South Queensland and Victoria in the 1985 Senior National Championships in Melbourne. However, that State took the treble by winning the U-15 and the inaugural U-17 Championships in Hobart in July as well.

Playing strengths in some states could be improved by promoting growth of junior girls' teams by expanding men's and boys' clubs. School approaches could be successful, as in Tasmania.

In NSW affiliated playing numbers will increase dramatically as current problems of non-affiliation are further examined. In some cases this could be achieved by cross affiliation from the district Associations to the NSW Women's ASF. The chance to represent Association, State and Australia should be open as the birthright of the players.

The AWSA appointed Mr Keith Gilmour as National Executive Director from April 1 1985.

This was made possible by Australian Sports Commission funding, the sacrifices of the States, and the much valued assistance of the Australian Soccer Federation and its Executive Director Mr Brian Emery with accommodation and support services.

Our personal contact, Mr Fred Vella, moved to another branch and during the past 12 months various officers of the bank have been in contact with the Australian Soccer Federation. All of these officers have been most courteous and also extremely understanding as to the cash flow situation of the Australian Soccer Federation.

### **MITRE**

To Graham McConnichie of Mitre, we extend the thanks of all the members of the code for your assistance for both the National Team and the National Youth Team. Your assistance to the National League is also greatly appreciated, together with a new method of assisting the juniors and the referees. This help in publishing the 'Laws of the Game' and 'Advice to Referee's Inspectors' is greatly appreciated. The publication of the modified rules of the games for younger players was a great hit. Thank you.

# **OCEANIA CONFEDERATION**

The Oceania Confederation this year came to life after many years of apathy. The funds were withdrawn from the General Account and allocated to a Technical Committee. As a result the International Coaches Academy was conducted in Australia in May. A further course was conducted by Oceania Instructors in Chinese Taipei in August. Introductory tours have been made through the Technical Director, Mr Alan Jones of New Zealand, and a programme has been laid down for the development of referees, coaches, administration and sports medicine throughout Oceania for 1985/1986.

The joint efforts of all members resulted in 30,000 Australian dollars being allocated by the Olympic Solidarity Funds to assist with a further promotion of coaching and administration, together with other technical aspects throughout the Oceania Region in 1986.

As mentioned in the last Annual Report the next priority for the Oceania Confederation is obviously the conducting of an Oceania Cup for Champion Club Teams from each of the members. This was discussed at the last Executive Meeting of Oceania, and it was determined that the initiative should be taken by Australia with New Zealand to instigate this Cup.



# FIFA — FEDERATION INTERNATIONALE DE FOOTBALL ASSOCIATIONS

During 1985 the Australian Soccer Federation had direct contact on four occasions with the world controlling body, F.I.F.A. The visit by the President and the Senior Vice-president is reported elsewhere in this report. By qualifying for both the World Under-16 and the World Youth Finals personal involvement was also conducted with F.I.F.A. in the U.S.S.R. and The People's Republic of China. The fourth occasion was the conducting of the F.I.F.A./Coca-Cola International Coaching Academy in Sydney during 1985.

Australia's participation in both the Under-16 and Youth Finals is a continuing reminder to F.I.F.A. of the development of football within our country. Much of the credit must go to the President, Dr Havelange, for the instigation of the Under-16 and Youth Championships, for it is through these titles that the impetus has been gained for the youth of Australia.

### AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF SPORT

The Australian Institute of Sport is now determining its level of the development of players within the game. Many good young players are leaving the Institute direct to National League Teams. The technical ability of the young players coming through to the top level of football is reflected in the time, effort and knowledge that has been instilled during their stay at the Australian Institute of Sport.

The development of players has reached such a stage that there is now a wealth of young talent in the National League who are eligible for the National Youth Team. This is a credit to the Institute of Sport for the development of these players in their formative years.

The Minister for Sport, Recreation and Tourism, the Honourable John Brown, should be congratulated on the path that the Institute is taking. Whereas some sports have early developers, as in gymnastics and swimming, this is not the case in football. At a world level, particularly at the World Youth Championships, it is realised that the 19 and 20 year-old players representing their countries have passed the development stage and reached the top leagues within their country. It is not fair to expect the 17 and 18 year-old developing players of the Institute to be able to pit their skills against the 19 and 20 year-old professional players from other countries.

However, as mentioned earlier, a great deal of credit must be given to the Institute for the number of 19 and 20 year-olds now playing in the National League.

On behalf of the Executive, we congratulate Jim Shoulder and Ron Smith on the dedication and personal touch that they instil in all the players in the Australian Institute of sport.
