Chairman's Report

Soccer's true potential in Australia will only be realised when it has been accepted into Australian mainstream society. As the newly elected Chairman I, along with my Board of Commissioners have taken on this task in the hope of succeeding in not just the immediate responsibilities of Soccer Australia but for soccer throughout Australia - from the juniors to the seniors; men and women; indoor and outdoor - it is our mission to position soccer into mainstream Australian society.

The stakeholders of Soccer Australia gave the mandate for change with the appointment of a new look Board. The new Board has taken on the challenge with renewed enthusiasm.

Soccer at junior level continues to enjoy increasing popularity. There are more kids kicking soccer balls around than all other football codes combined. On the international stage Australia's representative teams continue to enjoy increasing success. It is the Boards challenge to step up this success and take it to the next stage.

The domestic competition continues to be Australian soccer's greatest challenge. This became increasingly obvious following the Oz Soccer Summit held in Melbourne last May, where most speakers highlighted the need for an increase profile for the national competition.

In response to this, Soccer Australia announced in June 1995 the most attractive and strongest national competition possible, comprising of twelve of Australia's most elite soccer clubs, including the reentry of the Newcastle Breakers and entry of the newest soccer club, the Canberra Cosmos. Soccer Australia has been successful in spreading the Ericsson Cup to a greater number of regional centres with Perth Glory to be included in 1996/97.

Soccer Australia has been successful in bringing to the national competition a new naming rights sponsor in Ericsson Australia. Aware of the prospects for the future, Ericsson have committed themselves to a fiveyear partnership with Soccer Australia, evidence of the faith they have in the current direction of our game.

In addition to the improvements, Soccer Australia announced a lucrative pay television rights contract with Optus Vision. The deal allows the network to broadcast live two *Ericsson Cup* matches per week as well as *Coca-Cola* Socceroos and *Coca-Cola* Olyroo matches. Furthermore, the networks live coverage has given access to the commercial free-to-air networks, who now carry highlights of our matches in their news bulletins.

The third major initiative was the establishment of the Soccer Australia Traineeships scheme for talented young Australian soccer players. Every major soccer country in the world loses players to overseas championships leagues. However many of our talented youngsters play in lesser leagues than the Ericsson Cup because of a lack of opportunities and a lack of a suitable support system. Soccer Australia welcomes the partnership between the Federal Governments Department of Employment, Education and Training and the Ericsson Cup Clubs with over thirty Traineeships to be established. Soccer Australia realises that Australia's exceptional players will always seek to improve themselves overseas but our objective is to reduce the unnecessary talent drain and encourage players to stay in Australia.

To that end the Soccer Australia Traineeships may just be a start, but to us it is a very good start.

Soccer Australia continues to tackle a number of key issues.

- To increase the profile of the game in the mainstream media
- Expanding the revenue viability of the *Ericsson*Cup Clubs
- Providing more full time opportunities.

On the playing fields, Australia again continued to perform well. The *Coca-Cola* Joeys (Under 17) and



the *Coca-Cola* Young Socceroos (Under 20) again competed in their respective World Championships. Both teams performed well, reaching the quarter finals and, it is hoped that that elusive medal is only just around the corner.

The *Coca-Cola* Olyroos continued their preparation towards the Atlanta Olympic games with a series of matches both here and overseas. It is important that this team be given the best possible and available preparation for although the World Cup is to the soccer purist the ultimate event, most Australia's follow with a keener interest the Olympic Games. To qualify and perform well in Atlanta is a major boost to our game giving it exception exposure.

For the *Coca-Cola* Socceroos, Australia's national team, preparations continued for the qualifiers for the 1998 World Cup to be played in France. Matches against Colombia, Japan, and Ghana featured at home while a one-off match against Argentina at the invitation of the Argentina Football Association was a highlight. Despite fielding a relatively inexperienced side the *Coca-Cola* Socceroos performed well in front of one of the most demanding crowds in world football.

Soccer Australia, in its quest to provide the *Coca-Cola* Socceroos the best preparation for the World Cup and the Australian sports public the best soccer ever, announced a series of 16 internationals to be played per year with 12 of these games to be played within Australia. It is Soccer Australia's aim to lift Australia's World ranking into the top 25-30 by 1998 and thus improve our seeding in the World Cup. The games to be played in February 1996 are just the start of the international series

Soccer Australia welcomed onto the Board its newest Commissioner, respected television journalist George Negus. George was elected as an independent Commissioner and will be concerned with promotional and media aspects of the game, an area he is well qualified in. Peter Gray, representing the concerns of the states and Don Di Fabrizio were also appointed to the Board in 1995, bringing with them years of experience in the game.

Further changes saw the appointment in July of Soccer Australia's new Chief Executive David Woolley. David comes to soccer after a successful career in basketball involving both the national team and the national league.

In conclusion, I would like to thank our sponsors and the media for their support of our game in 1995. It has been a tough twelve months for the game but it is my feeling and the Boards that soccer has turned the corner and the future provides exciting prospects. I would like to congratulate the Melbourne Knights, the national league champions last year and wish all teams in the new look *Ericsson Cup* the best of luck in 1996. It is an exciting time for our game and we are determined to place the game well and truly in the mainstream of Australian society.

Chief Executive's Report

My appointment as Chief Executive commenced in the 2nd half of 1995. In that time it has become evident throughout the community as a whole that soccer is beginning to bear the fruit of the hard work that has been put into the game at all levels. It is now imperative that Soccer Australia build on the foundations that have been laid.

Soccer Australia is committed to build profitably the worlds premier sport with significant presence in Australasia. The organisation will have as it hallmark superior levels of service, excellent operational and financial performance drawing on the complementary strengths and shared values of all employees and stakeholders.

Australia at international level continues to make a positive impression on the world stage, but to continue this and to continue to develop soccer domestically we must focus our energy into developing a strong local competition that is capable of sustaining Australia's soccer players at all levels. To that end it is Soccer Australia's commitment to continue to develop the *Ericsson Cup* and to provide Australian soccer players with the very best competition possible.

The National League received its biggest boost when Ericsson Australia become the naming rights sponsor for the Ericsson Cup for the next five years. The confidence that companies like Ericsson and Coca-Cola have placed in soccer reinforces the market's confidence in the direction that Soccer Australia is now taking.

In addition to our corporate sponsors, Soccer Australia acknowledges the support of the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Olympic Committee in assisting the National teams. It is support such as this that has ensured the continued success for the Australian teams.

I would also like to thank on behalf of Soccer Australia the State Federations, Ericsson Cup clubs, the Australian Women's Soccer Association and the Australian Futsal Federation for their support over the past twelve months. We are committed to developing closer working relationships between all constituents throughout Australia. Together we will be the best and the most successful organisation in the sports, leisure and recreation industry.

To follow are the reports from all departments of Soccer Australia as well as the Australian Institute of Sport, Australian Women's Soccer Federation and the Australian FUTSAL Federation.

Marketing, Promotion and Media

October 1995 saw the birth of the Ericsson Cup and with it the partnership between a multinational company and Soccer Australia. Ericsson Australia announced a five-year agreement as naming rights sponsor for Australia's premier domestic league until the year 2000. The announcement of the Ericsson sponsorship alone shows that the market place has accepted the changes taking place in our game and the controversy of the past has been put to rest and we are now getting on with developing our game as a marketable product.

In addition to Ericsson Australia joining the soccer family of sponsors, Ansett Australia also took over as our domestic carrier in 1995. The contract announced in February 1995 was the best airline deal yet for Australian soccer and covers both the national teams and the Ericsson Cup teams.

For a number of reasons, one of the most important agreements made in 1995 was the pay television rights being awarded to Optus Vision. Their commitment to soccer as a driving force for the network can not be underestimated. Apart from the cash component of the deal, Optus Vision have made the agreement even more attractive by identifying soccer as one of the main sports on the network. Thus, Optus Vision, in their attempts to sell more subscriptions will devote greater promotional energy to soccer. Furthermore, their ability to provide to the free to air networks immediate vision of our games has resulted in increased television exposure of soccer on all channels.

International matches held in 1995 again were able to attract significant media coverage and in some centres, exceptional crowds. The February game in Brisbane against Colombia clearly showed Queensland's ability to stage successful international matches. In addition the *Coca-Cola* Olyroo international held in Wollongong was an outstanding success and an important event for the region. Matches held in Perth, Adelaide, Sydney and Canberra provided those centres with quality matches to showcase our game.

The national league in 1995 suffered without the funding from a naming rights sponsor and the withdrawal of the Newcastle Breakers. However, despite this, the Grand Final, held in Adelaide in May, was possibly the most successful in the history of our competition. With additional sponsorship from the Adelaide Tourist Board Hindmarsh Stadium's capacity was increased to over 15000, which was still not enough to cater for the demand for tickets. This



exceptional interest provided record television ratings in Adelaide and a great springboard for the future.

The next 12 months promises to be most exciting for our game. The focus for Soccer Australia is to be proactive in a marketing sense. In terms of sponsorship, merchandising and event management the marketing department will lead the way in exploiting all opportunities. A hero creation campaign will be developed; licensing arrangements with merchandising will be streamlined; publicity will be centred on both general media coverage, as well as soccer specialist media; the search for a large sponsorships will be proactive; advertising will be more contemporary; and the overall image of soccer will be enhanced to provide an inviting, sophisticated and value-added product.

Soccer Australia would like to thank its major sponsors whose contribution to our game is appreciated: The *Coca-Cola* Company, Ericsson Australia, the Australian Sports Commission, Optus Communications, United Distillers and Ansett Australia. Furthermore the marketing department of Soccer Australia acknowledges the efforts of its outside companies, the Stenmark Organisation and Angela Mihelcic and Associates.

Referees' Department

The year 1995 marked the end of an era for refereeing in Australia with the retirement of FIFA Referee, Richard Lorenc. Richard was a one of the referees selected for the National Soccer League when it began in 1977.

He was appointed by FIFA for duty in several international series including the inaugural Women's World Championship, the U/17 World Youth Cup in Chile and the World Cup Finals in Italy. His on-field experience and expertise will be missed.

It should be pointed out that, whilst the experience of a Richard Lorenc cannot be replaced overnight, the development programs put into place three years ago are already beginning to show fruit. Two referees, both under 24, from the Talent Acceleration Program have successfully completed their first season in the National League finishing in the top half of the Referees' Rankings.

FIFA continues to acknowledge the quality of Australia's linesmen with both Eugene Brazzale and Gordon Dunster drawing praise for their performances at the World Cup. Next year Eddle Lennie, last year's Samsung Referee of the Year, will join Eugene Brazzale and John Fraser on Australia's list of FIFA Referees.

Next year will also be the last on the FIFA list for John Fraser who reaches the FIFA retirement age of 45.

It is anticipated that another TAP graduate will join the Ericsson Cup Referees' Panel for the 1995/96 Season.

Whilst performance level will always be the criteria for selection at this and international level, it is pleasing to note the success of the TAP Program in accelerating the development of elite referees.

In conjunction with this program the process of accrediting Referees' Inspectors, begun in 1994 is continuing. The Level One Course has now qualified in excess of 500 inspectors.

The Level Two Course, due for implementation in 1996, is nearing the final stages of development.

Referee numbers have risen from last by just under 10%. This "flow-on" effect normally follows a World Cup and, whilst we intend to build on it, should not be interpreted as a vast boost to referee numbers. Even with this new influx the ratio of referees to players is approximately 1:100.

As participant numbers continue to grow we need to investigate all possible avenues to improve this ratio.

Coaching and Technical Department

COACH EDUCATION

In recent years there has been a global acknowledgement of the ever improving player development in this country. This is clearly borne out by the number of talented players who have now been contracted overseas.

During the year the number of Australian developed players playing full-time in Europe, Asia and South America peaked at 120.

The improved education of coaches at grass roots level, over the past two decades, has contributed significantly towards the growing quality of young players being produced.

In 1995 the number of accredited soccer coaches registered with the Australian Coaching Council broke the 13,000 barrier.

This places soccer firmly in number one position ahead of rugby league, rules football and basketball. A far cry from the 18th position held in 1990 and 6th position in 1994.



This status far exceeded our predictions contained in last year's Report.

The education of coaches remains an integral part of Soccer Australia's overall player development.

Much credit must go to the State Federations, their State Directors and Staff Coaches for ensuring that the grass roots development is ably covered.

INTENSIVE TRAINING CENTRES

The National ITC Program operates in conjunction with the Australian Institute of Sport, the various State Institutes and Academies, plus all major State Soccer Federations.

The ITC network plays a major role in the hands on development of our young elite players that feeds directly into our national teams' programs.

Whilst the ITC's service, in the first instance, the National Under-17's they also have become important part of the feeder system to the AIS residential program.

Each State program is overseen by former leading players or coaches with considerable experience and expertise.

A number of former national team players head up programs.

The Queensland Academy of Sport team is looked after by Greg Brown: the South Australian Institute of Sport team by Martyn Crook and the New South Wales Academy of Sport team by Steve O'Connor. In Western Australia Gary Marocchi headed up their squad on a joint basis with David Harrison.

In Victoria, former national soccer league coach Ernie Merrick is in charge of the very successful Victorian Institute of Sport.

During 1995 ACT appointed Chris Tanzey on a full-time basis to look after the men's and women's programs of the ACT Academy of Sport.

In the two years that the program has been in operation we are starting to see a great improvement in the quality of young players coming through right across the nation.

TALENT IDENTIFICATION

During 1995 a complete review of the talent identification programs was undertaken to ensure that

an adequate feeder system to our national teams was continued.

This followed FIFA's change to the qualifying birth dates of players and operative for the World Under-17, Youth and Olympic competitions.

Players participating in these events will now be eight months older and it is likely that in the more advanced countries of the world such players will be playing senior grade on a regular basis.

Therefore if we are to compete, as well as we have done in the past, it is imperative that we have a good system in place for both identifying talent and enhancing it.

In future the Under-15 Championship will be run annually whereas the Under-14's and Under-16's will be alternated. This system will ensure that players are identified well in advance for future world competitions.

With these changes Soccer Australia decided to inaugurate three new trophies for the requisite events, and in so doing honour three prominent people who have contributed much to the game in the past.

The Under-14's will therefore play for the Joe Vlasits Cup. Joe a former National Coach was for many years involved in coach education and the development of young players in New South Wales.

The Under-15's will play for the Eric Worthington Cup. Eric is a former National Director of Coaching. As such he successfully established the present day national coaching scheme and also laid the foundations of talent identification through the national coaching network.

The Under-16's will be playing for the Reg Date Cup. A legendary striker, Reg Date is recorded as having scored 664 goals in competition matches between 1937 and 1953 whilst playing for Wallsend and Canterbury. Reg passed away during the year and it is only fitting that his great feats are recognised and indeed promoted through the youth of the country.

The annual national junior championships are a very integral part of our overall national talent identification process.

It is from such championships our national coaching staff, the AIS coaching staff and the state ITC coaches have been able to make selection comparisons and judgements.

By bringing the best players together, from all parts of the country, and playing them in a FIFA styled format



provides an ideal setting.

Not only does it aid the selection process but, just as importantly, it helps to pre-condition players both mentally and physically to the rigors of relevant aspects of world cup football.

The Championships in 1995 were staged at Parklea, the home of Soccer NSW.

Despite some early bleak weather the resourcefulness of the tournament staff ensured that all games were completed successfully.

With the change in the age groupings it was possible to make an almost direct comparison with the previous years competition results.

Based on the combined results achieved in both age groups the biggest improvers were Queensland, Victoria, ACT and NSW in that order.

Australian Women's Soccer

Australian Women's Soccer has experienced a year which has combined growth and excitement with disappointment and difficulties.

Over the last twelve months, the AWSA has been active in developing a national elite program to ensure Australia's competitiveness against the World's top Soccer nations. 1995 was obviously dominated by the senior nations team's successful attempt to qualify for, and subsequently prepare and participate in the in the 2nd FIFA World Championships for Woman's Football. Whilst the results were a little disappointing, it is obvious that Australia is now competitive with the very best in the world.

The fact that Australia was invited to the United States after the World Cup to compete against the USA and the 1995 Worlds Champions Norway and that we performed creditably against those teams supports this view. At the same time we have a way to go before we are in a position to beat the best in the world. Our goal is a medal in the Sydney 2000 and on the performances of the senior team in 1995 (and those of our youth and junior teams), suggests that this is a reasonable goal.

During the period of the World Cup campaign, the national squad participated in thirteen training camps and an intensive overseas program consisting of 31 matches. This program included three preparatory tours, the World Cup qualification tournament for the Oceania Confederation, three competitive tournaments and the FIFA World Cup. The total win/loss record for the Australian senior team was:

Played Won Lost Drawn Goal for Goal Against 31 19 10 2 83 45

For full international matches, the win/loss record was:

Played Won Lost Drawn Goals for Goals against 20 9 9 2 41 39

The AWSA was very fortunate to have the services of a professional and dedicated back-up staff who have over the last twelve months put in an enormous amount of time and effort to assist the program and improve national team players. The National Coach, Tom Sermanni was given great assistance by some of our leading female coaches including Connie Selby, Leigh Wardell, Katrina Alexander and Karen Menzies. The sports Science/Sports Medicine team of Dr Keiran Fallon (Team Physician), Ed Hollis (Physiotherapist), Liz Broad (Nutritionist), Doug Tumilty (Physiologist) and Harry Wardle (Strength and Conditioning) would be the envy of many teams in any sporting code in the country and the AWSA sincerely thanks them for the role they

have played.

The National team was also very fortunate to have Ms Kerry Harris as our Tour Leader on many of the international tours. Mrs Michelle Sawyers, the team manager on all tours, worked tirelessly and made many personal sacrifices to work with the team. Ms Moya Dodd joined the squad for the World Championships component and did an excellent job in arranging all the administrative matters. Kerry, Michelle and Moya's support was greatly appreciated by the National Coach, other support staff and players. The AWSA appreciates commitment and efforts of the above individuals and looks forward to their continued support of women's soccer in the future.

The interest in Australian players by overseas clubs is testimony the development of our players and the respect they command on the world stage. Two national team members, Cheryl Salisbury and Sunni Hughs were both signed by Japanese club, Matsushita Panasonic Bambina for an initial one year contract. Cheryl and Sunni join Alison Forman (Denmark) and Angela Lannotta (Italy) as Australians learning their craft with overseas clubs. Whilst several members of the national team declined scholarships at major US Colleges, four National youth players are with US Colleges on scholarships.

Two young players, Lisa Casagrande and Michelle Watyson, benefited through additional training at the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) in Canberra under the watchful eye of Head coach, Ron Smith. The AWSA thanks Ron and the other AIS staff for the time they spent with Lisa and Michelle and looks forward to the AIS providing greater and more permanent opportunities For women's soccer in the future.

Communications with the Australian Sports commission and the Australian Olympic Committee during 1995 could not have been more positive. Both organisations have been most supportive of the AWSA during this time of rapid growth. Their financial support has been solely responsible for the tremendous development of our national squad over the last 18 months. The Australian Women's Soccer Association is particularly grateful to Sue Baker-Finch fro her wise counsel during the year.

The National Championships program continued to provide a means for identifying and developing future talent. These Championships also provide an elite level of competition over and above the that which is provided in the weekly State League Competitions. The Australian Capital Territory proved successful in taking out the Junior Championships in Flobart, whilst New South Wales won both the Youth and Senior Championships at Southport and Adelaide respectively.



Individually the State associations have had a most positive year. Playing numbers are on the increase in all states and we have had strongest State representation at National Titles. Organisationally, States are much stronger than in previous years and more able to take advantage of the obvious growing interest in soccer by young girls.

The AWSA's Intensive training Centre program has been implemented in five states/territories and one region - New South Wales, Northern New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia and the Australian Capital Territory. The ITC Program caters for players in the 15-20 years age bracket, and already the increase in standard of play at the National Junior and youth Championships has highlighted the benefit of the program.

1996 brings new challenges - it will be vital that the AWSA, Soccer Australia, the ASC and the AOC enjoy a shared vision of the future of women's soccer particularly in the lead up to Sydney. It s the responsibility of the AWSA and Soccer Australia to develop and articulate that vision to all of our stakeholders. We must re-examine our national team program and structure so that it supports that vision and give further consideration to developing national women's league. Our ITC programs must be reviewed in detail to ensure that they best serve national needs while also providing an important support for the elite players in states. The whole of our coaching organisation must be reviewed so that it becomes more coherent. We must also promote more actively the many outstanding young females who are beginning to appear in coaching and officiating. Associations need support within the states if they are to provide for even greater involvement. In particular, the development of under age competitions is essential and we must move our sphere of influence into primary schools.

The AWSA is a much more mature organisation now than at any time during its brief history. As an association we now have the capacity to take a strategic view of the future, offering greater opportunity in our future dealings with Soccer Australia and Government Agencies. Women's soccer has grown up and is alive and well. Congratulations and many thanks to all those who have been part of its development especially Mr David Woolley, Mr Don diFrabizio, Mr David Hill and the staff of Soccer Australia.

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Futsal has had to understand its environment very well in order to achieve its goals through set policies and management strategies, that in essence, reflect the fundamental principals which demand sound financial management and equality in resource distribution with State Associations.

Often it is not possible to gauge the success of planning in the short term, but already the strategies of FUTSAL Australia are showing dividends which have manifested themselves in increased participation at all levels.

The Federation has a clear commitment to women in Futsal. So much so that a joint proposal to the International Body by Soccer Australia and the Federation, was successfully received by FIFA, thus awarding Australia the First Women's Worlds Futsal Championships, scheduled for February, 1997.

Internationally, Futsal Australia misses no opportunity to be an ambassador for the sport, with twenty-two teams having participated in either tournaments or invitation carnivals in Europe, , England , South America and New Zealand.

Australia hosted women's teams from Canada, Russia and England competing in a Four Nation Tournament in conjunction with Futsal'96, the 17th National Futsal Championships. This Tournament was contested by four hundred and ninety teams covering State Representative, Regional Representative, Club, Intellectually disabled and Aboriginal.

I wish to thank the Australian Sports Commission and its staff for its support and co-operation which extends beyond its financial contribution to the Federation, their advise and assistance is very much appreciated.

INTELLECTUALLY DISABLED PROGRAM

Futsal has had what could only be described as a most successful period in terms of what has been achieved in the program t date.

The volunteer Committee base has increased in turn has enabled Futsal to introduce ëCome and try days' for beginners.

Intellectually Disabled players compete in State and Regional Competitions at the National Championships. This in turn leads to the integration of disabled players into able bodied competitions, A.C.N. 008 540 770



1995 saw an increase of 25% participation in this area from 1994. This growth is due largely to the outstanding efforts by Ms Dawn Gilligan, National Program Director and the very able staff she has assembled.

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM

The International program was once again very successful for Futsal with the Men's Team competing in Brazil in the Mini World Cup between Australia, USA, Paraguay, Uruguay, Brazil and Argentina. Australia's standing internationally is improving with every tournament.

The Junior International Program enables Futsal to identify Elite players and accustom them to all facets of touring. In Particular, Futsal's exchange program with Brazil offer Elite players the opportunity to train with Brazil's best coaches- which in turn enriches the quality of Futsal in Australia through both coaches and players.

DEVELOPMENT

Expansion is always essential to guarantee success. Futsal is very committed to developing all areas of the sport including coaching, refereeing and administration. Western Australia is now well on the way to forming a State Association and will be hosting their first State Championships in 1996.

The Northern Territory is becoming established with centres in both Darwin and Alice Springs now operational. Futsal has been included in the Arafura Sports Festival to be held in Darwin in 1997. This will further expand the sport throughout Australia.

Futsal Acknowledges invaluable assistance given in this area by the Australian Sports Commission, not only through funding, but in all areas of human resources.

Finally the Australian Futsal Federation thanks Soccer Australia and all the staff for their valued assistance in fostering the game of Futsal.
