Editorial

Another dose of wet grounds brought a further crop of surprises last Saturday.

In Division I, Footscray City, bottom all the season, defeated Sunshine United, and have climbed out of the relegation zone to be above their opponents and South Yarra.

Prahran, after the heavy defeat by Juventus the previous week, unexpectedly beat Park Rangers at Como Park. Box Hill very nearly became the first team to lower the colors of Juventus. Only a late penalty brought the black and whites to even terms.

It was unfortunate that a sudden storm washed out the Yallourn-J.U.S.T. game at Yallourn. The Yugoslav team will have to visit Yallourn again and the latter lose the Rowe brothers this week.

Sandringham, by defeating Preston, goes up three places in a jump to third place in Division 2.

Continuing on their winning way in Division 3, Polonia has had only five goals scored against them, while the huge total of 72 has been credited to them.

The position of second place in Division 3 is very open. Fairfield, Moorabbin, White Eagles, Williamstown, and Ulsterville are all within striking distance for promotion.

In Division 4 Dandenong upset Maccabi, and Apollo suffered a reverse at Frankston. The position now is that any of these four teams, plus Marybyrnong and Slavia, can earn promotion. Only four more rounds, including the one postponed for the Carnival, remain to go.

Cup Ties will soon be with us. Until then the next few weeks will decide the fate of all clubs for another season.

This week a letter to the V.A.S.F.A. from the Peninsula Association asked that boundaries of that association should be set and stabilised. This raises a very good point which must of necessity be settled by the V.A.S.F.A. It becomes obvious, with the rapid spread of soccer, that unless boundaries of country associations are determined in good time quarrels and disputes may arise between adjacent associations regarding outlying teams.

All country associations are beginning to feel their feet. Next season a considerable extension of most of these distant leagues can be expected. To facilitate the efforts of these associations, the V.A.S.F.A. has invited two members of each to a conference with the council at the Hotel Federal, Melbourne, on Saturday, August 10. The object of the conference is to give the country associations a chance to air their problems and to find a way how the State body can assist them to spread the Code.

The State Lightning premiership to be held on Sunday, August 3, is well under way. The six-a-side teams will be something new to Victorian eyes. These games should draw a capacity crowd to the grounds concerned.

SECRETARY'S NOTES



DOCKERTY CUP AND RESERVE CUP

Every club should have in their possession a copy of the Cup rules. If not, apply to the secretary immediately.

An extra 30 minutes will be played, if required, in each round of both Cup competitions, with the exception of the semi-final and final rounds.

Where a First team and Reserve team are drawn at home on the same Saturday, the Reserve team is required to find another ground on which to play. Failing that, play must be on the opponents' ground.

All home clubs are required to notify their opponents of exact directions to reach ground.

All results must be phoned immediately after the match has been played to the secretary (Tel. No. U8347).

Pucka Rovers, Morwell, Albury City, and Upper Yarra Dam S.C. will play all their matches in Melbourne area.

Cup Competitions.—The draw for the Dockerty Cup and Reserve Cup (first two rounds only) was made on Thursday, July 3, at a meeting of the League management committee.

Coach.—Negotiations are now in hand with the Australian Soccer Football Association to obtain the services of a coach from Britain.

Transfers.—All players are reminded that no transfers can now be granted for the 1952 season.

Blazers.—The council has resolved that State blazers shall be given to the manager and all players of the Victorian team who won the 1952 Carnival.

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Soccer "Who's Who" —No. 17

LYN VAN PELT

Born in London, despite his Dutch-sounding name, William (Lyn) van Pelt first kicked a soccer ball at so early an age that memory fails him. He can remember, however, that he played for his school and later when he started work he managed to make the Works team also.

In 1938 Lyn arrived in Melbourne at the age of 18 and in the 1939 season played with South Melbourne, in which year they won the 2nd Division championship. For four years Lyn stayed with South Melbourne. In 1944 he joined Brighton and it was in that year that Brighton had the first of their two war-time Dockerty Cup victories.

While playing with Coburg in 1945 a recurrence of an old cartilage trouble caused Lyn's retirement from the playing side of football. But the game was too much in his blood, for after a season or two of standing on the touch-line Lyn joined the Victorian Referees' Association. That was in 1948; and during the next three years he became so prominent amongst the "whistle-blowers" that in 1951 he was elected to the vice-presidency of that association.

This year sees Lyn at the top of the tree in the proud position of president of the Referees' Association. At the head of this article we see Lyn in a characteristic attitude—giving a free-kick—an action beloved by the supporters of one team and howled down by those of the other.

Lyn, however, cares nothing for the roars of the mob. If he makes a decision he sticks to it and 99 times out of 100 he is right (though not every one thinks so). To many of us the referee's job seems an unenviable one, but Lyn loves it.

The first experience of refereeing a big game was Victoria v. Jugoslavia, when Victoria became the first side to take a point from the visitors. Next he controlled England v. Victoria game at the M.C.G. last year.

This year he refereed Queensland v. New South Wales at Olympic Park and Victoria v. New South Wales at Toorak Park in the Interstate Carnival games. He insists that the game he enjoyed refereeing most in his career was Queensland v. New South Wales.

Lyn says that he joined the Referees' Association to criticise those much-criticised gentlemen, but he quickly became converted and is now right behind them with all he can give them.



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
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HOME *and* AWAY

BIG TEST FOR U.S.A. SOCCER TEAM

The following were exempted from the first round of the soccer tournament at the Olympic Games, following the draw at Helsinki:—Dutch Antilles, Sweden, Germany, Finland and Turkey. The 11 qualifying matches are Brazil v. Holland; Chili v. Egypt; U.S.A. v. Italy; Soviet Union v. Bulgaria; Britain v. Luxembourg; France v. Poland; Rumania v. Hungary; Denmark v. Greece; Austria v. Saar; Mexico v. Norway, and Jugoslavia v. India.

QUICK WORK

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The New Rule of Soccer

After inspecting several books of 1950 and earlier vintage on "Rules of Soccer Football," I find all are contrary to the new rule passed by the International Football Association in June, 1951, and brought into vogue on July 25, 1951. Having in my possession the addenda to Law 12 Rule 2 received last month from England, I quote the new rule regarding obstruction:—"A Player Committing the Following Offence—When not playing the ball, intentionally obstructing an opponent, i.e., running between the opponent and the ball, or interposing the body so as to form an obstacle to an opponent, shall be penalised by the award of an Indirect Free-kick to be taken by the opposing side from the place where the infringement occurred."

After seeing the First Division players and referees this year, who are first-class in this code in Australia, it is easily seen where the rule is being unknowingly broken on numerous occasions, such as defenders obstructing a player for the benefit of a goal kick; a player obstructing an opponent to secure the benefit of a throw-in; a player sliding full length in front of an opponent when he knows the ball is out of reach; obstructing an opponent to allow a fellow-player to get his kick in, and several more cases of the same nature, all of which are now penalised by an Indirect Free-kick.

The main purpose of the rule is easily seen, that a player must make a bee line for the ball under all circumstances, thus making for a better and cleaner game. I have spoken to some Melbourne referees on the matter and they seemed surprised when they read the rule. As president of the Latrobe Valley and Central Gippsland Schoolboy Associations, I am often asked my opinion of obstruction. After reading this, both schoolboys and adults will understand why I am quoting against my talks and lectures of last year on the subject. As I am not in constant touch with the administrators of the code in Melbourne, I feel sure they will take the matter up and bring it into operation. As there are 140 juniors and 100 seniors playing in this district, I hope Soccer News and the V.A.S.F.A. will excuse me using their paper to advertise the new rule, as even schoolboys look forward to your weekly paper.

Most soccer clubs which sponsor junior and schoolboy teams will eventually be "on top" in the soccer world. From experience, I have found that the formation of youth clubs guarantees a regular supply of first class players for the future. The club I am personally attached to is the Middle Park Youth Centre. This club provides many players both to the local soccer club and local junior cricket clubs.

Migration is now assisting many clubs in obtaining first class soccer players, but it must not be forgotten what happened some years ago when the regular inflow of migrants suddenly ceased. Where were we a few years later when these migrant players also ceased to exist as class soccer players? The present regular influx of migrants to our country must not be allowed to lead us into a false situation, particularly as regards the progress of soccer in Victoria. We must look ahead and plan for that period, when the schoolboys of today will be the senior players of tomorrow — that period when the young migrants of today are no longer capable of holding their regular places in the "first team." To do this effectively, my advice to all soccer clubs is to start a youth club in your district. You would not only be ensuring your club's future, but you would be providing an insurance to the boy for his future as a citizen of our country.
